Happy Campers

Our Blue Central Campers were delighted recently to be presented with a cheque by Struan, who is the manager of the Co-op branch in Rosyth.

This is the third time local Co-op members have chosen Scottish Autism's Blue Central Campers as their local community cause. Our group has to date received a whopping £4,715.37!

The donations from the Co-op have allowed us to buy new equipment for our camping in June and will fund our annual event for the next couple of years.

The Blue Central Campers were unofficially named a few years ago by one of our biggest fundraisers, Robert and the name has been with us since. The group have been fundraising for their annual short breaks for autistic individuals for around ten years now.

Robert is a young man with Asperger's who attends our Blue Central day services. Robert was one of our regular campers, attending for over nine years, and amongst his other fundraising achievements, has climbed the Munro's and walked the West Highland Way to help financially support this break to take place over the years.

Although Robert has now "retired" from the trip itself he continues to fundraise and now takes on a new role with great pride - setting up the tents and the campsite with Scott for the others who attend.



The group has supported numerous autistic individuals over the years, from "old hands" such as Uisdean and Robin who have attended almost every camping break, to newer campers such as Craig and Jack who have been attending for two and five years respectively.

Since their first trip, the group has grown and developed greatly in line with our service provisions. What was initially a short break opportunity for a small group within day services, developed further to include campers from both a number of our services including housing support, day services, outreach and independent living support.

The Football Supporters Group "The Tartan Army" is another significant benefactor who have enabled us to provide this opportunity year after year to the young people who enjoy the annual camping trip.
